Odyssey's Class of 2025 was delighted to welcome Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra's CEO, Joe Loehnis, to class along with Bill Banfield, composer and organizer of a five-year Musical Landscapes in Color project celebrating and recording the works of living Black composers. Joe and Bill were joined this year by Patrice Rushen and Andre Myers, who engaged with our students, shared their backgrounds, and discussed their musical compositions being performed the next night.

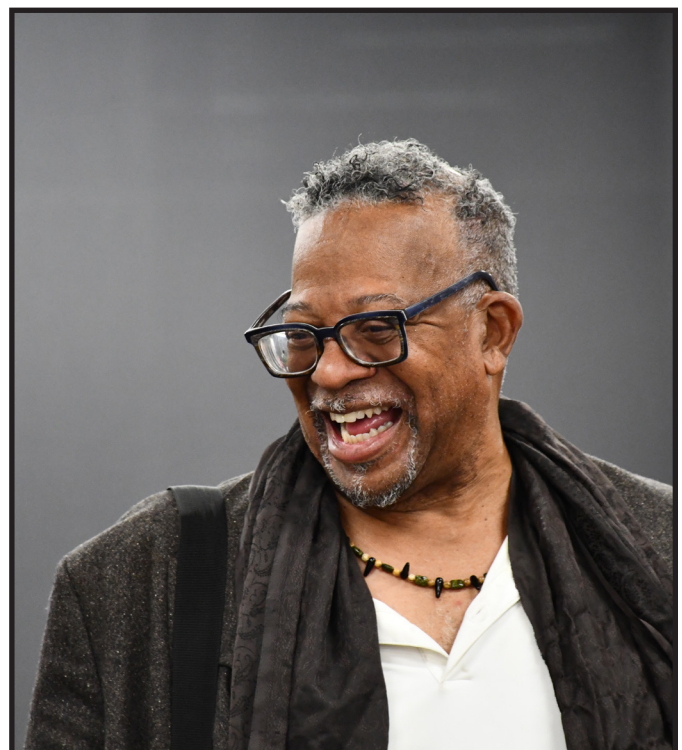

At the concert, I cried listening to Andre's piece. I was moved by the music.

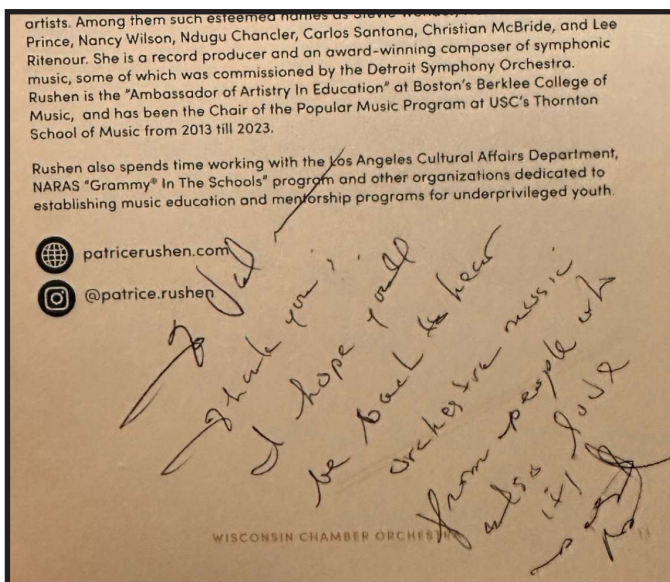
